traces to Romolo FUSARO in Lima and Cincinnati, Ohio starting 1905. The family originated in the small village of Fossalto, near Campobasso in south-central Italy near the Adriatic Sea. Many extended family members of Romolo also immigrated. Most were tailors who became clothes designers in America. By 1960, branches of the family could be found in Detroit, Dallas, Fort Lauderdale, Cincinnati, and Philadelphia. Other confirmed surnames in this line include Simone, Meale, Di Coccia and Bagnoli in Fossalto, Italy.

EARLY FUSAROS



When Romolo and Antonetta lived in Italy in the early 1960's, they researched Romolo's genealogy and secured their "after the fact" (not original) birth certificates. According to an Italian researcher they emploved about 1962, the Fusaro line can be traced to northeast Italy, near Venice and is associated with several important families in Italian history. LEONARDO FUSARO wrote deeds for the Republic of Venice (no date given). In 1562 in Rome, TOMASO FUSARO was knighted (given

the title of "Cavaliere") by Ottavio Farnesse, whose wife was the daughter of the Holy Roman Emperor. In 1693, GIOVANNI TOMASO FUSARO was treasurer for the powerful Estensi family. Members of the Estensi family were hereditary dukes of Modena, Reggio, and Ferrara (south of Venice) for several centuries. More recent members of the Fusaro family include a lawyer VINCENZO FUSARO, a medical doctor coincidentally named ROMEO FUSARO and two 19th century writers of some note, ELVIO and ERMENEGILDO FUSARO. It is unclear if these Fusaros were direct-line ancestors of Romolo, or merely relatives. Another branch of the family originated near Naples but appears to be undocumented.



It is unclear how or when Romolo's family appeared in Fossalto. It was on this same trip to Italy that Romolo purchased the FUSARO Coatof-Arms (previous page). The accuracy of the research above has not been verified. On the other hand. Romolo's nephew DINO (Constantino) FUSARO obtained church records during a visit to Fossalto in October, 1997. Such records are usually, but not always, reliable. The church name is Chiesa Santa Maria Assunta and is part of the diocese of Trivento. The pedigree on the previous page is derived from these church records.

Local records from the Church of Santa Maria Assunta in Fossalto (obtained by Dino FUSARO in 1997) show that Constantino was prolific to say the least when it came to having children. He and his 1st wife, Maria Beatrice SIMONE (daughter of Giovanni SIMONE & Dominicangela BAGNOLI) had 7 children. But none survived to adulthood. It is unknown why. Dorothy Fusaro

HARN recalls hearing that Maria was not healthy and that she was frequently nursed by her "sister." Dorothy also recalls hearing that Constantino fathered Romolo's brother, Fortunato Nicola SIMONE, with his wife's "sister," out of wedlock. The church record confirms that Nick was born out of wedlock and that, surprisingly, Nick's

mother was also named Maria SIMONE, the same name as Constantino's wife. But the 2nd Maria SIMONE's middle name was Concetta and her father was Angelo Maria SIMONE so the 2 Maria SIMONEs are positively two different women. City records confirm Maria Concetta SIMONE was not the "sister" of Maria Beatrice SIMONE, as recalled by Dorothy, but a niece,



the daughter of Maria Beatrice's brother, Angelo Maria SIMONE. Maria Concetta was a full generation younger than Constantino. Contrary to the church record, not only Fortunato but also Romolo and Nicetta (real name Bernice SIMONE) were children of Constantino and Maria Concetta SIMONE. There is an error in the 1997 church record on this point: Fortunato, Beatrice (Nicetta) and Romolo were full siblings. Because Nick and Nicetta were born before Constantino and Maria Concetta SIMONE were married and Romolo was born after they married, Fortunato and Beatrice had the legal surname SIMONE while Romolo the legal surname FUSARO. However, Nick and Nicetta used the surname FUSARO for everyday purposes since they grew up in the household of Constantino, who married their mother while they were young. It appears then, that Constantino had 7 children with Maria Beatrice SIMONE

(none survived) and 3 with Maria Concetta SIMONE: Nicholas, Romolo and Nicetta. When Maria Concetta died at age 32, probably of Cholera, Constantino married a much younger woman again, Antonia CARRELLI, the sister of his daughter Nicetta's future husband Oreste. (According to Gary CAR-RELLI, grandson of Nicetta, this mis-match in ages caused some tension in the family.) Antonia was the daughter of Angelo CARRELLI and Ottavia MEALE. She and Constantino had 2 sons, Guido and Mario. Both were born when Constantino was in his late 70's. A son of Mario, Dino (short for Constantino) FUSARO, obtained the church records on the following page. According to Fabrizio FUSARO, grandson of Mario through Enzo, Dino suspected Mario and Guido's biological father was not in fact Constantino but a man surnamed PIETRANTONIO. Although 4 of 5 of Constantino's surviving children immigrated to America, Constantino did not. Both Annette Bellucci FUSARO (daughter-in-law) and Gary CARRELLI



(great-grandson) state that Constantino was the mayor of Fossalto, which is confirmed by city records (see following page). Dorothy Fusaro HARN recalls hearing that he died falling off a horse when he was 82 years old. No known photos exist in America of Constantino. He is buried in Fossalto but there are no photos of his grave marker.

According to her social security application form, her mother was Maria SIMONE. According to her cemetery record, her father was Constantino FUSARO. She was born 07/03/1886 when Constantino was 65 years old. She died in Cincinnati on June 26, 1977. She appears with her husband Oreste and their 4 children on the 1930 census.)

John P. HARN's speculation:

The entry on the church record for Romolo FUSARO (in red, above) is incorrect since his mother would have been 68 years old at the time of his birth and there would have been 25 years separation between Romolo's birth and that of his nearest sibling. Matching the birthdates of Romolo and Fortunato (Nick) they, together with Nicetta, are the children of Constantino and Maria Concetta SIMONE, not Maria Beatrice SIMONE. According to Dorothy Fusaro HARN, Romolo said his mother died giving birth to him in 1890. In fact, she died when he was 2 years old, in 1893 (surely he had no memory of her). This helps explain the timing of Constantino's marriage to Antonia CARRELLI, also in 1893.

Summary of Major Life Events

- ▶ Constantino Fusaro was born March 9, 1823 in Fossalto, the son of Giuseppe FUSARO and Maria Rosa MEALE. Giuseppe's parents were Michele FUSARO and Antonia Di COCCIA. Maria Rosa's father was Francesco MEALE. Fossalto's population was 2,000.
- ▶ On March 2, 1849, Constantino married **Maria Beatrice SIMONE**. Between 1850 and 1865 hey had 7 children, the last of which was born in 1865. All 7 died young, without leaving children of their own. Their names were Maria Concetta, Cristina Amalia, Giuseppe, Felicia Palma, Giulietta, Giovanni and Maria Concetta again (the first had died before the second's birth), thus 5 girls and 2 boys. Two of these children lived to be 10 years old, the others died before their 2nd birthday. The last child died in 1866.
- ▶ In 1878, for one year only, Constantino was the mayor of Fossalto. (According to Annette BELLUCCI, he also served as head of immigration (possibly "emigration?").
- ➤ Constantino FUSARO and Maria Concetta SIMONE (this was his 1st wife, Maria Beatrice SIMONE's niece) had a child, Fortunato Nicola SIMONE (Nick), on March 1, 1884. They were not married at the time. Contantino's 1st wife, Maria Beatrice SIMONE was still alive. Thus Nick's legal surname was originally SIMONE rather than FUSARO.
- ▶ Maria Beatrice SIMONE died April 17, 1886 in Fossalto at the age of 62.
- ➤ Constantino FUSARO and Maria <u>Concetta</u> SIMONE had another child, **Beatrice SIMONE**, (Nicetta) on July 3, 1886, three months after Constantino's first wife died. Nicetta's parents were not married at the time she was born. Although her original surname was SIMONE, she used the name Nicetta Fusaro in America (and probably in Italy as well).
- ► Constantino FUSARO and Maria Concetta SIMONE married on October 7, 1886, three months after Nicetta was born and six months after Constantino's first wife died.
- ► Constantino FUSARO and Maria Concetta SIMONE had their 3rd and last child, **Romolo Hugo FUSARO** (Romeo) on June 21, 1890. At the time of his birth, his father was 67 and his mother was 30 years old. They had been married 4 years.
- Maria Concetta SIMONE, mother of Nick, Nicetta and Romolo, died April 15, 1893 when Romolo was 2 years old. She was born January 10, 1861, making her 32 years old at the time of her death. Maria Concetta SIMONE was the niece of Maria Beatrice SIMONE. Maria Concetta's father was Angelo Maria SIMONE, who was Maria Beatrice SIMONE's brother. Maria Concetta was 38 years younger than her aunt, Maria Beatrice. Nevertheless, she married her aunt's widower, Constantino FUSARO, and bore him three children.
- ► Constantino FUSARO married Antonia CARRELLI on July 15, 1893, 3 months after his 2nd wife died. (Antonia's brother, Oreste CARRELLI, would later marry Constantino's daughter Nicetta.) Three children were born to Constantino and Antonia CARRELLI:


MARIA b. July 11, 1896. She was born dead.

GUIDO VITTORIO b. Jan 15, 1898. He immigrated to the U.S.

MARIO b. April 23, 1901. His children immigrated to the U.S.

- Constantino FUSARO was 78 years old at the birth of his last child, Mario, in 1901.
- ➤ Constantino died February 19, 1905 in Fossalto. Fossalto's population was about 3,000.

SUMMARY

Constantino and his first wife were about the same age. They had 7 children but none survived to adulthood. His 2nd wife was his first wife's niece and thus a whole generation younger than he. Their 3 children all survived to adulthood. When his 2nd wife died young (probably of cholera) he married another very young woman who was the sister of his daughter Nicetta's future husband. Constantino and his 3rd wife had 2 children and both survived to adulthood.

ENGLISH TRANSLATION OF THE ABOVE LETTER

"Today I am sending a copy of the list of mayors from 1809 until today, pulled from-the book of Don Antonio PIZZI, "Fossalto, History, Traditions, Rural Life," which shows Constantino FUSARO as mayor in 1878.

On some local birth certificates dated 1878, Constantino FUSARO has signed them as "town-councilor senior working as mayor for holder absent" and not as mayor. (He is "acting mayor" while the official mayor is away.) I am sending a partial copy of a birth certificate with Constantino's signature.

I could find nothing in the archive regarding the nomination of Constantino as Mayor or Councilor.

Maria Beatrice SIMONE (Contantino's first wife) died 04/17/1886 in Fossalto.


Maria Concetta SIMONE, mother of Fortunato Nicola SIMONE (and Constantino's second wife), was born in Fossalto 1/10/1861. She married Constantino Gregorio Costanzo FUSARO 10/07/1886. She died 04/15/1893 in Fossalto."

Fanny LIZIER, who is not a family member but a woman John P. HARN hired to help with research and translation, sent the following message to John in 2008 after reading PIZZI's entire book in the original Italian: "I finished to read the book of Don Antonio Pizzi, the Fusaro family is mentioned a few times. It was a

small family, a few members are mentioned. I was hoping to find what profession they did, or in which part of town they used to live but I could not find anything precise. There is mention of a Mario Fusaro who was a forester, of Francesco Fusaro (Constantino's father), Ulisse Fusaro, Maria Fusaro and Vincenzo Fusaro who was mayor from 1975 to 1999. Probably Maria Concetta Simone died of cholera, there was a huge epidemic in 1893. Father Pizzi was the priest in Fossalto for 50 years and he still lives there. From the two times I talked to him he seems to have a good memory, and I am sure he knows much more than what is in the book."

Photo, right, is the author Don Antonio PIZZI showing his manuscript to Pat CARRELLI, wife of Robert CARRELLI, (a grandson of Nicetta FUSARO) during their visit to Fossalto in 1978 (see following page). PIZZI's book was unfinished at that time. According to Fanny LIZIER, who helped John P. HARN communicate with officials in Fossalto and San Demetrio Corone, "Pizzi was for 51 years the pastor of the parish in Fossalto. He told me that he retired last year (2007)." Note crucifix on wall. He was 77 years old in 2008 and 47 years old at the time this photo was taken by Robert CARRELLI in 1978.

came to the U.S. in 1905, at the age of 15. He arrived alone, passed through NYC, and went directly by train to Cincinnati to join his older brother Nicholas, his sister Nicetta and their 3 uncles Simone. Nicholas and Nicetta arrived in the U.S. 1 year before Romolo. They sometimes lived together and sometimes apart in both Lima and Cincinnati where Nick and Romolo worked as tailors. Romolo lived with his sister

Nicetta and her husband, Oreste CARRELLI, in Lima in 1916. Romolo was president of the "R. Fusaro Co." a tailoring company in Lima in 1917. His vice-president and treasurer were both non-Italians. Also in 1916, during WWI, Romeo filled out a US military draft registration card. He was 26 years old, unemployed, single and listed his address as 2307 St James Ave. in Cincinnati, (brother Nick's address). He was 5'3", weighed 120 lbs and stuffed himself with bananas and water to try to gain enough weight to pass the draft physi-

cal. He never served in the army. Romeo's naturalization certificate, dated September 16, 1916, was issued in Lima, OH and shows his address as 774 Brice Ave. in Lima, the same address for his company. He seems to have moved freely between Lima and Cincinnati, spending most of his time in Lima. About 1920 he moved to New York City. It is unclear exactly why, but possibly due to a friendship he had with either Mr. Colucci or Mr. Castelli. One day while in the Bronx, he stepped into a doorway to get out of the rain. It was the Bellucci residence. When the door opened, he met **Antonetta BELLUCCI**, 19 years old. They married on July 25, 1921 at Chiesa Di Nostra Signora Del Carmelo (Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church), 627 E. 187th St. Bronx, NY. The marriage certificate shows her name as "Antonetta" although her family called her Annie. About 1926 Romeo, with at least one partner, founded Silverstrype Co, a men's clothing company in New York City. The company did well at first, but during the Great Depression Romeo lost a substantial amount of money. (According to daughter Gloria, one partner embezzled money and another threw himself in front of a train.) The 1930 census shows Romeo as a 38 year old clothes designer living with "Annette" (29 yrs old), their daughters Gloria (7) and Dorothy (4) and Annette's mother



"Marian" (70 & widowed) in "upscale" Scarsdale, N.Y. Prior to moving in with Romeo and Annette, Marian lived with her oldest son Frank and his family. In 1936 Romeo got his social security card. His SSN, 093-10-7657, was issued on 12/16/1936, only 18 working days after the very first issuing day. On the actual card's reverse, someone typed: "Silverstrype Co, Inc. 22 Bronson Ave, Scarsdale, NY," Romeo's home address. Brother Nick had remained in Cincinnati with his wife Virginia and their three children, Armando, Mary and Delores. In 1940 Romeo & family moved back to Cincinnati where Dorothy and Gloria attended Withrow High School and University of Cincinnati. Marian moved back in with son Frank at this time, staving in NY, Romeo worked for Hyde Park Clothes across the Ohio River in Newport, Kentucky. In the mid-1950s, after both daughters were married, Romeo moved to New Jersey to work as a designer with McGregor Clothes. He retired at age 65 and he and Annette moved to Turin, Italy, staying for about 8 years. In Turin, he worked again as a clothes designer. He was well known in his field and was sought after by employers. He told his Italian employer he was only 55 and his youthful

looks fooled them. This caused him some trouble with the U.S. Social Security Administration when he returned to the U.S. About 1964 he and Annette retired, this time for real, to the Fountainhead Condominiums in Lauderdale-By-The Sea, Florida. Grandson John P. Harn visited them several times there as a teen-ager (sometimes with his brothers, sometimes alone) and remembers swimming with Romeo in the Atlantic Ocean at the crack of dawn (Romeo's idea). As the waves crashed into them, Romeo (5' 3" tall) would make a fierce boxing stance facing the waves and shout, "I'm the big strong man of the sea!"



No middle name is given for Romolo. The street name where his parents, Constantino and Maria Concetta Simone FUSARO, lived at the time of his birth is "Alley Primo Piano Gallo." The modern name of this street might be Via Alfieri. Constantino is shown as an "owner." According to translator Fanny Lizier, "Constantino's profession is not simply owner, but landowner (land and buildings)." He appears to have been relatively well-off financially.

Constantino's signature (below) is enlarged from the bottom of the original document (above). Note it's similarity to his 1878 signature on a previous page.





Romolo FUSARO in Lima, Ohio Naturalization / Citizenship

Romolo had some minor difficulty applying for naturalization (citizenship). He first applied in January 1916. Frank Colucci and James W. Gensel were his 2 required witnesses. (A man named Ralph Gensel was the treasurer of the R. Fusaro Co. mentioned in article at right.) One of his witnesses was declared invalid (reason unknown) and Romolo filed a new application shortly afterward, this time with Michael and Rose SIMONE (Romolo's maternal aunt & uncle) as witnesses. It appears that Romolo couldn't remember if he had immigrated in 1905 or 1906 since both dates appear several times on the same form. While preparing to file his application in late 1915, he received a letter from the Commissioner of Naturalization stating his immigration record had been found and that he arrived on the S.S. Citta di Napoli on June 30, 1905, departing from Naples. It is not clear why there is confusion about his arrival year. The newspaper article at right was printed the same day his naturalization was approved.

Klimant Naumin, born in Strouga, Turkey, resides in the rear of 406 North Pine street, arrived in New York on June 23, 1907; recommended by Ray R. Hitchens and L. N. Cremean.

Peter Marie Hulsken, born in Arnhem, Netherlands, resides at 111 South McDonel street, arrived in New York on January 26, 1904, recommended by T. D. and Warren J. McLaughlin.

Romolo Fusaro, born in Fosalto. Italy, resides at 774 Brice avenue, arrived in New York on June 30, 1903; recommended by Michele and Rose Simone.









Allen County courthouse (built 1884) as it looked in 2009. This is where Romeo filed his application for naturalization in early 1916.





Romeo FUSARO's diamond ring (right) engraved on the inside with "Romeo Fusaro March 9, 1916". This was apparently a gift commemorating Romeo's officially becoming a U.S. citizen. It is unknown who gave it to him but John P. HARN speculates several relatives chipped in to buy it for him. Ring was in the possession of John P. HARN in 2009, inherited from his mother, Dorothy Fusaro HARN, Romeo's daughter, in that year. Both Romeo and Dorothy wore it for decades. It is visible on his right hand in several photos from the 1930s & 1950s.





Romeo had a non-conformist, independent streak, which he probably inherited from his father. Constantino had a history of ignoring taboos in his own community (having children out of wedlock, twice marrying a girl at least 30 years younger than himself after his wife died...). Amy Carrelli (wife of Nicetta's grandson Gary) recalls hearing that in Fossalto, teachers would line the children up to go to mass and that Constantino, who didn't respect church leaders, would pull Romolo, Nicholas and Nicetta out of the line. When Nick and Romolo came to America, they attended a Presbyterian rather than a Roman Catholic church, a radical choice for rural Italians. Armando FUSARO (Nick's son) states that Nick avoided Catholicism due to "corruption" in the church. (Romeo later attended Catholic churches but was not very religious.) When Romolo lived in Lima OH, he started a company with two non-Italians. Neither of his children had Italian names. These things, taken together, show a willingness to abandon the old ways and follow a new path.

Since Romeo does not appear on the 1910 or 1920 census, this is the only census available (in 2007) that includes him. It shows his immigration year as 1909. Other documents show 1905. Romeo was known for confusing dates, including his birth year and age. This census shows Annette's native language as Italian whereas the 1910 Bellucci census shows it as English. She was only 1 year old at the time of immigration and likely grew up bilingually. She may have played a valuable role as translator/interpreter for her mother and older siblings.







The company was organized in 1908 by Oscar Levine, and it became one of the major menswear manufacturers in the area throughout the 1950s. By 1954, Hyde Park Clothes had employed approximately 1,100 workers. It discontinued its manufacturing operation in the early 1970s and became a wholesale distributor and retailer. In June, 2009, Romeo FUSARO's daughter, Gloria Ann Fusaro BERNARDINDI introduced John P. HARN to Betty MURPHY, who worked at Hyde Park Clothes at the same time Romeo did. Romeo FUSARO was Betty's boss and she remembered him clearly. According to Betty:

"Romeo wore perfectly cut suits. He was short. I guess you could say he was a fair boss. My husband (Tom Murphy) was a model there, a cocky Irishman. One day when I went to the bathroom, Romeo saw I was gone and broke into mad Italian. He left Hyde Park when the war came. His nickname was "Fuzzy" Fusaro. He was the big shot. It was the end of the depression. He didn't have any enemies. I was a button marker. Romeo hollered, "Who is the girl Murphy is marrying!" He never tried to lower my wages. I worked there 1939 till the war. Romeo worked there 8 years. He was funny, soft-spoken."

Betty Murphy lived in the same nursing home as Gloria Fusaro Bernardini and was about 87 years old in 2009. According to Gloria, the story about Romeo shouting out, "Who is the girl Murphy's going to marry?" was meant to show that although he was the boss, Romeo was friendly to the lowest paid workers.

MEMORIES OF ROMEO FUSARO

DOROTHY FUSARO HARN REMEMBERS...

THAT her father, Romeo FUSARO, made grape wine in a locked room in the basement with a friend named Dan. Dorothy and her sister Gloria were supposed to keep it secret since it was illegal.

THAT her father, Romeo FUSARO, "ruled the roost."

THAT no one in her house was allowed to talk during the Lowell Thomas radio program.

THAT one year Romeo tried to get rid of their Christmas tree by tossing it over the 2nd storey deck and it damaged the deck and the side of the house.

THAT her grandfather, Constantino FUSARO, gave her uncle, Nick FUSARO, money to attend tailoring school in Rome but when Nick got there, he spent the money partying and trying to impress girls. When Nick returned to Fossalto, Constantino was very mad and told Nick to go to America.

STEPHEN M. HARN REMEMBERS...

THAT his grandfather, Romeo FUSARO, chain-smoked 3 Kent brand cigarettes while walking after dinner, and that he didn't smoke otherwise.

JOHN P. HARN REMEMBERS...

THAT his grandfather Romeo used to give John and his brothers "butt-wipes" in crowded places. A "butt-wipe" is when you run your hand quickly up the crack of someone's butt in order to surprise them in a crowded place and then pretend you didn't do anything. Romeo did this many times but John specifically remembers Romeo doing it in a crowded elevator at the upscale Fountainhead condominiums and then acting like he didn't know what the commotion was about (about 1967).

THAT Romeo was impressed by wealth and titles. When he told stories about people, he would often describe them as being, "Chairman of the Board," which meant that we should all be impressed.

THAT Romeo's favorite author was James Michener.

GLORIA ANN FUSARO BERNARDINI REMEMBERS...

THAT when her father Romeo first arrived in Cincinnati from Italy, he wore a monocle and spats and that his uncle and brother wouldn't let him go outside of the house dressed like that.

THAT soon after arriving in Cincinnati, Romeo went out to mail a letter to Italy. He didn't know his way around the "big city" and used a tobacco store wooden Indian as a landmark. He didn't know that there were many wooden Indians outside of many tobacco shops. He got lost and walked for several hours until he found his way home.

THAT when she was in Jr. High School, her sister Dorothy decided she wanted to be called Jean (her middle name) and tried to get everyone to call her that.

THAT according to Romeo and his brother Nick, the priest in Fossalto was "playing around" (had girlfriends).

THAT Romeo's clothing company in New York (Silverstripe Co.) folded for financial reasons before the family moved to Cincinnati. The treasurer was embezzling money and one of the partners jumped in front of a train, killing himself.

THAT she and her family moved from Scarsdale to Cincinnati in 1940.

THAT her family homes on Observatory Hill Rd. and Westminister Dr. were rented. Romeo lost money when he sold his Scarsdale home and vowed never again to buy a home. He advised Gloria never to buy a home.

THAT one day when they lived in Scarsdale, Romeo won a chicken. He brought it home and her mother Annette BEL-LUCCI killed it and cooked it for dinner.

THAT Romeo and Annette sailed to Europe on the Queen Elizabeth II (John P. HARN's note: It was more likely the U.S.S. Constitution) and he brought with him ready-to-wear machinery for tailoring not available anywhere in Italy at the time.

THAT Romeo wore a ring with a Masonic symbol but Annette made him take it off.

Maria Concetta Simone FUSARO died in 1893, when Romolo was 2-3 years old, possibly of Cholera. According to the History of Fossalto by Don Antonio PIZZI (see following pages), there was a Cholera epidemic at that time.

In 1861, Fossalto was in the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies. Italy was not unified until 1871 and was made up of several smaller kingdoms in 1861.

Maria Concetta SIMONE had 3 brothers and 1 sister who immigrated to Ohio. It is unknown if she had other siblings who stayed behind in Fossalto but it seems unlikely given the fact her father, Angelo Maria SIMONE, immigrated to Ohio in 1903 to live with his son Michele SIMONE in Lima, probably because there were no children left in Fossalto to take care of him in his old age. Maria herself never came to America but her 4 known siblings did, within a few years of her death at age 32 in 1893. Her husband, Constantino FUSARO, was 68 when she died. He remarried, fathered 2 more children (Guido & Mario) and lived until 1905.

Seven other passengers on this page were also from Fossalto. He had \$7.00. He could read and write. He intended to stay with his son, Pasquale Simone, who lived at 223 W. 6th in Cincinnati. He will later appear on the 1910 census of another son, Michele Simone, living in Lima, Ohio. He died in 1912.

Different records assign him different occupations during his lifetime. The birth certificate of his daughter Maria Concetta (previous page) shows his occupation as shoemaker. His ship manifest/arrival record lists him as a carpenter. His death certificate shows he was a retired merchant. And Annette BELLUCCI, who married his grandson Romolo FUSARO, described him in a letter to John P. HARN as, "a musician, poet, astronomer and orator"!!

It is unclear exactly why he traveled to America at the age of 71 in 1903. Perhaps his wife, Philomena MEALE died in 1903. All his children had immigrated to Ohio or died. Maybe he had no family left in Fossalto to care for him. Romolo and Angelo lived in Lima, OH at the same time, from about 1905 to 1912, and no doubt they interacted often. Dorothy Fusaro HARN, Romolo's daughter, was unaware until 2008 that Romolo's grandfather had come to America and was buried in Cincinnati, the city she lived in for many years.

Angleo Maria SIMONE must have known Romolo's father, Constantino FUSARO very well since Constantino married, and had children with, both Angelo Maria's sister, Maria Beatrice SIMONE AND his daughter, Maria Concetta SIMONE.

Both show parents as Angelo Mario SIMONE and Philomena MEALE. Both immigrated from Fossalto, before Romolo did. Edna married a Tony FUSARO from Fossalto, but his relationship to Romolo, if any, is unclear. He came to Cincinnati first and Antonia and their children joined him later. Their children were Josephine (married name Mastropaolo, Lillian (married name Malora) and Maggie (married name unknown). Michele's (Mike's) wife, whom he married in America, was Rose Ellmann. She was born in Ohio of German immigrant parents. Their children were Angelo, Marietta, Luella, Franklin, Magdalena and Martha. Both Mike and Edna lived first in Cincinnati. Edna stayed there until her early death in 1913 but Mike moved to Lima sometime before 1907 apparently to work for the railroad, although he had a vegetable and fruit retail store there for many years. He was active in the Christopher Columbus Society in Lima.

Four years after that Mike and Rosa will sponsor Romolo's naturalization application. Mike will die in 1948 and Rose in 1957. Romolo lived nearby but was not counted in the 1910 census.


Mr. Simone was born in Sausalto, Italy, Sept. 27, 1866. He came to this country in 1893 and had lived in Lima 50 years.





Robert CARRELLI is the grandson of Nicetta Fusaro CAR-RELLI and the son of her firstborn, Alfred. He was born out-ofwedlock and at the age of 5 was adopted by another family when his mother could not longer take care of him. He grew up without his Carrelli relatives in his life. In the summer of 1978 he set out to change that. After getting in touch with his Carrelli uncles, aunts and cousins in Cincinnati, he and his wife Patti visited Fossalto, Italy, the birthplace of Nicetta Fusaro and Oreste Carrelli, the grandparents he had never known.

In his own words, from his autobiography *LUCKY LIFE*:


"It was a quiet little hillside town, and nothing seemed to be going on the Saturday we drove into it. The night before, we had stayed in the nearby city of Campobasso, and luckily for us, had found a map showing how to get to Fossalto. We saw a group of elderly men sitting around the town square, so we parked the car, got out, and approached them. I had studied Italian that spring and asked one of the men the first of my prepared questions, "Prego, dove e il municipio?" I asked him where the town hall was, since we figured logically it would be the first place for family records. He told me it was closed and asked me why I had come to Fossalto. I produced the picture of my grandparents which my Uncle Ray (his cousin Gary CAR-RELLI's dad) had given me. He squinted at it, put his glasses on, studied it carefully for a moment, and then his face lit up, and he exclaimed, "E il mio zio! E il miozio!" That's my uncle! And so it was. My grandfather, Oreste Carrelli, was this man's uncle. His name was Romuldo Carrelli, and he had lived in this little town all his life. Although he hadn't seen him in many long years, he recognized my grandfather in the picture. He knew Oreste had emigrated to America, and that he had settled in a place called Cincinnati. By this time other people were gathering around to look at the picture. Among those who gathered around us was Romuldo's niece, who was visiting from London and spoke English and Italian. She was able to translate the rest of our conversation. I told her the complete story of my background and the reason for our visit, and she translated it to Romuldo, who upon hearing what I did for a living, proudly announced to the others hovering around, "E il maestro!, E il maestro!" He is a teacher! He is a teacher! I never got that kind of recognition at home. This was great. These were my kind of people. Italian blood flowed like Chianti in my veins! After a lot of talking and translating, the niece took Pat, Romuldo, and I out to the local cemetery to see the Carrelli graves, of which there were many. Carrelli was the most common name in town, and when I mentioned that one of my early ancestors had been "il sindaco," the mayor of the town, (Constantino FUSARO, Nicetta's father) that caused another stir. Next we were taken to see the parish priest (Don Antonio PIZZI), who showed us around his church, a small, tidy place, and then proudly introduced us to his life's work, his Magnum Opus. He had decided many years earlier to trace and record the history of all the families in Fossalto. He was a sincere, dedicated man, but he was only up to the 1700's so far. This would be his life's work, all right, but only if he lived to be 200 years old! We stayed a bit longer, talking to various people, eating lunch with Romuldo and his niece, and then, since we had a room in Campobasso waiting for us, we reluctantly said goodbye to this charming little town and the relatives I had met and the history I had discovered, and drove away. As far as I know, I was the first and possibly the only Carrelli ever to visit the town where it all began."









A group photo is reproduced on the following page. Fanny LIZIER translated PIZZI's pages on this group as follows:

"Corporate and government benefits for workers, even in the far away land of America, were not established until the 1950s. At the end of 1800s and the beginning of the 1900s, it could be a real tragedy for emigrants in America to be sick or have a misfortune at work. The modest savings put aside by most workers for emergencies was not enough to cover costs incurred by serious illness, death or emergency repatriation to Italy.


In Cincinnati, Ohio, a group of Fossaltoese conceived and established a legal entity, the **Society of Mutual Aid** (also called the Fraternity of Fossaltoese) on January 25, 1915. The founders were: Pasquale SIMONE, Antonio SIMONE (Romolo, Nick and Nicetta's maternal uncles), Carlo ORLANDO, Francesco BARONE and Concezio MAIORINO.

All members between 16 and 55 years of age paid dues, which increased according to age. The joining fee for first-time members was \$2 if you were 16 years old or younger, and up to \$7.50 for members 55 years or older. In addition, annual membership dues of \$12 were paid by all members. Every year elections were held in December for President, Secretary, Vice Secretary, Treasurer and inspectors (trustees). There were also official positions during ceremonies or parades including Marshal, Sergeant of arms, and a Flag carrier. The Society was of great help to Fossalto emigrants and their families up until the years after WWII when government programs provided similar benefits.

Aid was given for the usual cases of illness or minor accidents. In the case of a death of a member, all other members paid an additional fee for the aid the surviving family members.

In the parish (of Fossalto) we keep a copy of the original statute of the Society, it was sent by Mrs. Giovanna Colangelo, who was the Secretary of the Society in 1931. The President at that time was Teresina Valerio. The Society operated until the 1970s. One of the last responsible members was the Secretary, Mr. Giovanni Di Girolamo, son of Vincenzo, who emigrated in the fifties. The Society shut down completely in 1973, at that time Mr. Riccardo Orlando, of late Simone, was President and Giuseppe Presutto, of late Francesco, was the Secretary."








was born in Westchester Co. NYC, the younger of 2 daughters. She spent most of her first 14 years at 22 Bronson St. in Scarsdale where she lived with sister Gloria, her parents and her maternal grandmother **Mariangela Liguori BELLUCCI**. Of her days in Scarsdale, she remembers having a lilac tree that was visible from the window in the dining room of her house. She remembers that she preferred playing marbles

and kick-the-can with the boys in the neighborhood than dolls with her sister and friends and that her parents did not approve. She attended a private Catholic school, Immaculate Heart of Mary. She had to walk a long distance home from school because her father was at work and her mother sang opera on a live radio program at 3:00 each day. Her grandmother was at home after school. Dorothy remembers winding up the Vitrola in her grandmother's room, playing records and listening to the music as the record slowly wound down. There was a strawberry patch behind the garage that Dorothy cultivated with Marian. As was common in that era, Dorothy and her sister were not encouraged

to learn Italian, the native language of her father and mother. After 9th grade at Eastchester High School, her family moved to Cincinnati where she attended Withrow High School and then the University of Cincinnati, where she earned a degree in Social Work. Her family first lived at 26 Observatory Hill in Cincinnati

then moved to 1251 Westminster Ct. in Bond Hill. She was 17 when she met **Paul H. HARN Jr.** who also attended University of Cincinnati. At a sorority house party, he helped her carry a stack of records then asked her to go to dance with him. It was 1942 and he was in the army and enrolled in classes at the same time. Shortly afterward, Paul was sent to Europe to fight. After the war they married and raised 4 children in Cincinnati OH, Dayton OH, Farming-

ton MI and Birmingham MI. In Farmington, she worked occasionally as a substitute teacher, sometimes in her own children's classroom. She would sometimes play the piano and sing for her family. After Paul's sudden death from a heart attack in 1974, Dorothy married Melvin Singer in 1977. They lived in Niceville FL and Atlanta GA. After Melvin died of cancer in 2001, she moved to Woodstock GA to be closer to her son Stephen M. HARN, who took care of her in her later years. After several months of declining health due to kidney failure, she died May 3, 2009 in the company of her 3 surviving sons and several grandchildren. 


In the stories she told me about her childhood, my mother Dorothy FUSARO had fond memories of her back yard in Scarsdale. Of course, time had filtered these memories through a nostalgic gauze. But she remembered a lilac tree she could see from the table where they shared meals, and strawberries in the back yard that she picked with her grandmother. To her, these were markers of a contented life. I flatter myself by believing my own family somewhat mirrors hers. I too have 2 daughters, 3 years apart, who grew up inseparable. My own contentment ran deepest during the early years, when my daughters were the ages of Dorothy and Gloria in these photos. Spending time in our own back yard, on the swing, in the wading pool, sleeping in a tent, eating from our own rough garden, these were the markers of our contented life. Like Romeo, I managed, despite the odds, to create with my wife a child-centered, peaceful suburban life where all our needs were "effortlessly" met. Romeo and I were both entrepreneurs. We both married late. The economy boomed in the 1920s and again in the 1990s. We had our "golden years" at the same point in our children's lives. The photos on this page hold a powerful attraction for me. I believe that when they were taken, Romeo, the girls, and Annette-behind-the-camera were deeply contented. How could they not be? They were together in sunshine, in a place where lilacs and strawberries mattered.



I'm so answire to get the Banky Palace occupied by the Harry fris. that I can think of little else. Thank God we have so much to do, else I'm sure twould seem like 33 months.




